RECYCLABLE FACTS

ALUMINUM

You can recycle aluminum over and over again, and there is really no limit to it. Aluminum cans can actually be recycled and put back onto the shelf at your local grocery store in just about 2 months.

PAPER

Each American uses around 680 pounds or 85 million tons of paper each year, and most people just throw it away instead of recycling it for further use. 2000 pounds of recycled paper can actually help to save 17 trees, over 350 gallons of oil, and a lot of landfill space. That also means less air pollution! 24 trees are cut down to make 1 ton of newspaper. Recycling a stack of newspapers just 3 feet high saves one tree.

CARDBOARD

Recycling cardboard only takes 75% of the energy required to make new cardboard. One ton of recycled cardboard saves 46 gallons of oil.

PLASTIC

Enough plastic is thrown away each year to circle the earth four times. Plastic bags that are thrown into the ocean can kill over a million sea creatures a year. Over 25 trillion Styrofoam coffee cups are thrown away each year, just by Americans! Styrofoam never decomposes.

GLASS

Glass is 100% recyclable and can be used again and again. Any color can be recycled. A modern glass bottle would take 4,000 years or more to decompose - and even longer if it's in the landfill.

PROGRAMS

The most important service the District provides to the residents and organizations of this community is its role as a clearinghouse of information related to the recycling and proper disposal of solid waste. Daily, the District fields phone, email, and other inquiries from residents about recycling and disposal options.

Additionally, the District provides several waste management services to ensure residents have effective and practical ways to recycle valuable materials like paper, metals, glass, plastics-keeping those items from landfills and incinerators. The District's household hazardous waste program gives Shelby County households a way to properly dispose of material that threaten our soil, air, and water if not handled properly.

SERVICES PROVIDED **ONLY** AT THE RECYCLE CENTER 1316 N MICHIGAN RD, SHELBYVILLE **HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE**

The Recycle Center is provided for the purpose of properly disposing of household hazardous waste. These types of materials should not be poured down a drain or sent to the landfill or incinerator. Storing them in a garage or basement is dangerous and impractical.

Latex paint should not be brought to the Recycle Center for disposal as it is not hazardous. For proper disposal, mix an absorbent material (cat litter, dirt, sand) with the paint and allow it to harden. Once solidified, it is safe for disposal with normal household trash; lids should be left off the paint cans so trash haulers can recognize that the paints have been hardened.

PROGRAMS

SHARPS PROGRAM- NEEDLES AND LANCETS

Used needles and lancets are dangerous because they can injure people, spread germs and disease. Do not flush used needles, put needles in recycling, or throw loose needles in the trash. For proper disposal, the District will provide a free sharps container. When full, return for proper disposal and receive a new container.

CONFIDENTIAL DOCUMENT SHREDDING

Identity theft resulted in \$46.9 million in losses in the State of Indiana in 2021. We accept confidential documents to be shredded onsite immediately for proper disposal. After the documents are destroyed, the paper is recycled.

FOOD WASTE RECOVERY PROGRAM



The District offers disposal of food waste for compost. A 5-gallon bucket is provided, fill it with acceptable items listed on bucket, bring to the Recycle Center to empty the bucket. The material collected will be applied to farm fields in Shelby County offering a natural product for fertilizer. Also, compost will be available at the Recycle Center for those participating in the program.

RECYCLING

Plastics: Food, beverage, shampoo, lotion containers, etc. Must be rinsed and clean. Labels and lids can remain.

Glass: Food and beverage bottles and jars only. Must be rinsed and clean. Labels can remain. Glass collected goes to Knauf Insulation to be used in their manufacturing process.

Metal: Food and beverage cans only. Must be tin and aluminum and must be rinsed and clean. Labels can remain.

Car Seats: Remove straps and fabric from car seats and booster seats.

Paper: Office paper, file folders, newspaper, junk mail, softback books, cardboard, telephone books, boxes. Staples and window envelopes are accepted.

Styrofoam: Clean styrofoam to include cups, food packaging, packing styrofoam.

Alkaline Batteries: AA, AAA, C, D batteries accepted. 9-Volt accepted but please tape the terminals.

Printer Cartridges: Any type or condition accepted.

PROGRAMS

OTHER SERVICES PROVIDED

TURN IN YOUR PILLS

Prescription medications are dangerous as they can pollute our water and damage septic systems and water treatment plants. Do not flush prescription medications, put in your recycling or trash. For proper



disposal, take your medicines to the Shelby County Criminal Justice Center. There is a drop off site located in the lobby. It is available 24 hours per day, seven days per week. The Shelby County Criminal Justice Center is located at 107 W Taylor St, Shelbyville.

FLAG RETIREMENT

The American flag should never be disposed of in your trash or recycling. For proper disposal, there are flag retirement boxes available at various sites for your convenience.

PROGRAMS

COMPOST



The District provides grinding of yard waste to the City of Shelbyville. Once the yard waste is ground, it is a very rich compost material which is available to residents. It can be used as a bedding material for plants and trees. Contact the Shelbyville Street Department for available times to pick up the compost.

NUISANCE SOLID WASTE ORDINANCE



Improper disposal of solid wastes, standing and stagnant water, and overgrown grass and weeds can be injurious to human health, and plant and animal life; can contaminate surface and ground waters, and can interfere with the enjoyment of life or property. Ordinance No. 2023-07 allows for abatement and/or clean up of properties that are found in violation. The District provides a Compliance Officer that

investigates claims of violation and then enforces the ordinance. A copy of the ordinance can be found on our website at www.cleanshelby.org.

To file a complaint on a property, please contact our office at 317-392-8904 or a complaint form can be completed online and emailed to us.

CLEANUP VOUCHER

We offer an opportunity for residents to dispose of their heavy bulk items. Some items for proper disposal include the following: mattresses, box springs, furniture, carpeting, building materials, and garbage. Call our office to receive a voucher to redeem at the Shelby County Transfer Station for free disposal of those items.

PROGRAMS

RECYCLING DROP OFF CENTERS

The District currently provides seven recycling drop off sites located in Shelby County. Users of the recycling drop off sites are asked to abide by the rules posted at the locations and not place materials other than those listed in the recycling bins. Additionally, material should not be placed on the ground outside of the recycling bins. The District reserves the right to discontinue any site due to illegal dumping and contamination. Office paper, file folders, newspaper, junk mail, softback books, cardboard, telephone books, boxes. Staples and window envelopes are accepted.

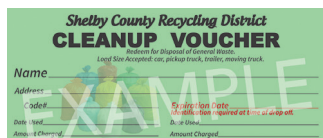

COMPOSTING

Composting is the natural process of decomposition and recycling of organic material. Compost is a great fertilizer for gardens, flower pots and flower beds. For more information on composting, see "Purdue Extension" contact information or see "Food Waste".

Easy Backyard Recipe:

- 3 parts brown
- 2 parts green
- A dash of soil

1. Mix ingredients into a bin or pile
2. Keep compost moist but not wet
3. Stir ingredients occasionally

Green - Nitrogen Sources

Fresh grass clippings
Garden trimmings
Fruits / Vegetables

Brown - Carbon Sources

Dry leaves / grass
Chipped brush or twigs
Sawdust

If the compost pile has a bad odor, add more brown materials. If the compost pile is too dry, add water or more green materials. Mix completed compost in with soil.

COMINGLE RECYCLING

Refers to placing all recycle material together with no separation of items.
Do not bag recyclables.



COMPUTERS & ELECTRONICS

1.2 million computers and TV's are discarded by Hoosiers annually. There are at least 5 toxic materials found in today's electronic devices. As of January 1, 2011, electronics are prohibited from being discarded by Indiana households, public (including charter) schools, and small businesses and therefore, must be recycled. Electronics can be dropped off at one of the following locations:

CONCRETE

COOKING OIL

Never pour cooking oil/grease down the drain. It can cause severe damage to septic systems and wastewater treatment plants. See "HHW" for disposal.

CRAYONS

Used crayons can be donated to shelters for other kids to use. Also look at ways to melt them down and reuse them in an art project.

CURBSIDE RECYCLING

Curbside recycling is available to all residents of Shelby County. Contact your waste hauler to see if they provide residential recycling service. If your waste hauler does not provide curbside recycling, contact the SCRD to find a hauler that does. See "Garbage Removal" for a listing of waste haulers for Shelby County.

DETERGENT BOTTLES

Most curbside recycling programs and co-mingle recycling bins will accept plastics numbered 1-7 (no #6). Check the number on the bottom of the container, inside the triangle of chasing arrows symbol, to determine if it is recyclable or not. Containers must be rinsed and clean of debris.

DISINFECTANTS

Unused disinfectants can be hazardous. Please read the label and if they are, please dispose of them properly. See "HHW" for disposal.

DOCUMENT SHREDDING

Document shredding is a great way to avoid identity theft and continue responsible recycling. Shredded paper is acceptable in recycling bins, however, please use a paper bag to contain the scraps. Witness your confidential documents destroyed at the following site:

Window glass, light bulbs, microwave glass, and clear drinking glasses are not recyclable; they are chemically different than the glass in bottles and jars and are contaminants to recyclable glass. HEAVY TRASH PICK-UP

PAINT

Paint is typically either oil-based or water-based (latex). To determine which type of paint you have, if it's not clearly indicated on the label, the oil-based paint will be labeled as "flammable" or "combustible" and must use turpentine for clean-up. Latex paint will be able to be cleaned up with soap and water. See "latex paint" for disposal options. Oil-based paint is hazardous and needs to be disposed of properly. See "HHW" for disposal.

PAPER

Paper can be recycled in any curbside recycling program or comingle drop-off location. Please read the instructions on the side of the comingle bin to make sure the appropriate items are being recycled. See "**Recycling Bins (Comingle)**" for a listing of bin locations.

PET WASTE

Pet waste is a health hazard and a water pollutant. If left laying in the yard, bacteria from pet waste can wash directly into storm drains and drainage ditches and eventually into our waterways completely untreated. Pet waste does not make a good fertilizer and is actually toxic to your lawn, causing burns and unsightly discoloring. Beyond your grass, dog feces is one of the most common carriers of heartworms, whipworms, roundworms, parvo and several other diseases. The preferred method to dispose of pet waste is

- 1) to scoop it up and flush it down the toilet so that your sewage treatment plant or your septic system can treat it.
- 2) seal the waste in a plastic bag and throw it in the trash.
- 3) bury small quantities in your yard where it can decompose slowly.
Dig a hole one foot deep, put 3" - 4" of

waste at the bottom and cover with at least 8" of soil.

Keep your hole away from vegetable gardens.

PESTS

Stop pests without the use of toxic chemicals! Try these handy tips below:



Ants - Put chili powder, dried bay leaves, or lemon peels at point of entry; put lemon juice in holes.

Fleas - Sprinkle non-iodized salt on carpets; it kills the larvae but won't hurt rugs.

Flies - Put out a well-watered pot of basil. Also, lemon wedges with cloves inserted.

Mice & Rats - Put mashed potato powder or buds in strategic places. Place a separate dish of water alongside the buds. Another option is to put Irish Spring bars of soap near entry points.

Mosquito Repellent - Plant basil around the house

Moths - Place cedar chips or equal parts of dried rosemary and dried mint in locations where clothes are stored.

Roaches - Put equal parts of powdered sugar and baking soda in small containers.

Spiders - Add 10-15 drops of peppermint oil in a spray bottle of water. Spray where spiders tend to hide.

PHONE BOOKS

Phone books can and should be recycled. These can be recycled in your curbside recycling program or in most paper recycling drop-off bins. Please read the instructions on the side of the bin to make sure the appropriate items are being recycled.

PLASTIC

There are many different types of plastic. Plastics recycled in Shelby County includes #1 - 7 (no #6). The most common #6 is Party Solo Cups. This number can be found inside of the small triangular recycling symbol located on the bottom of the item. If you do not see the recycling symbol, it is not recyclable. Plastics numbered 1 - 7 (no #6) are able to be recycled in your curbside recycling program or in any drop-off

co-mingle recycling container. Caps do not need to be removed, nor do labels. Please read the instructions on the recycling bin at any drop-off location to make sure the item you are recycling is accepted in that bin. See "Recycling Bins (Comingle)" for a listing of bin locations.

RECYCLE

Recycling is the process of taking a product at the end of its useful life and using all or part of it to make another product. The internationally recognized symbol for recycling includes three arrows moving in a triangle. Each arrow represents a different part of the recycling process, from collection to remanufacture to resale. Recycling is a simple way that you, as a consumer, can help out the environment, create a profitable market for recycled goods and help preserve natural resources from being depleted. See "Garbage Removal Services" to find a waste hauler in Shelby County that possibly provides curbside recycling services.

RECYCLING BINS (COMINGLE)

Comingle recycling bins are designed to collect a variety of recyclable materials, without having to sort items. Please check the instructions on the side of the recycling bin to make sure the item you are recycling is accepted in that bin. Typically, a comingle bin will accept paper, cardboard, aluminum, glass, and plastic. Plastic items must have a recycling symbol on the bottom of the item. 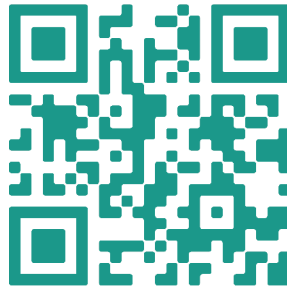
